

Reception learning overview 4th September –20th Oct 2023

This half term in our **Getting to Know You** topic we will be...

Communication, Language and Literacy

- Playing in the role play areas – home corner and shop
- Working on speaking and listening activities with a focus on developing our listening and attention skills in small groups and learning the importance of listening to help us follow simple instructions
- Exploring books and borrowing our first library books
- Starting guided reading sessions in school
- Starting Phonics and beginning to think about listening for sounds in words, e.g. what words begin with a 's' sound? We will listen for rhyme and complete a rhyming string, e.g. cat, bat, sat, fat, hat, mat
- Using Bug Club, begin learning the sounds s, a, t, p, i, n, m, d, g, o, c, and k
- Name writing – what letters are in our names? How do we form these letters correctly?
- Learn our letter formation using Kinetic Letters



How you can help at home

- Share the reading books which are sent home and comment in the reading diary, we aim for reading 4 times a week at home
- Practise rhyming with your child, can they think of a word that rhymes with yours?
- Help your child to learn the nursery rhymes sent home.
- Practise the letter sounds that are sent home and think of words that start with that letter sound

Personal, Social and Emotional Development

- Developing our confidence within the classroom and Early Years area; selecting and choosing our own resources and knowing who to ask if we need some help
- Learning about our school's Golden Rules
- Learning about friendships, sharing and taking turns
- Beginning to understand children's rights particularly our right to learn and play



Expressive Arts and Design

- Creating self-portraits using mirrors for colour matching
- Exploring using different art mediums; paper, paint, pencils and chalks
- Exploring sounds we can make with instruments
- Learning new songs in class and for Harvest



Mathematics

- Singing number songs
- Counting – accurate counting and ensuring 1:1 correspondence (counting each object only once!)
- Recognising some numbers and understanding these numbers in different forms e.g. concrete objects, pictorially, numerals

How you can help at home

- Sing lots of number rhymes and show fingers to match the numbers
- Look at numbers in the environment e.g. car number plates, door numbers etc.
- Counting objects at home accurately e.g. counting up and down stairs, knives and forks as laying the table, fruit and vegetables whilst shopping, etc.



Understanding the World

- Exploring the Autumnal changes that we notice in our outdoor environment as we enjoy regular 'welly walks' around the school grounds and talk about what we see
- Exploring Belonging and celebrating our similarities and differences
- Exploring the classroom, the school and the outside area



Physical Development

- Completing gross motor and fine motor activities
- Managing our own hygiene – hand washing and toileting with increasing independence
- Controlling our movements – exploring different ways of moving through a space
